

**Economic DI continued to deteriorate sharply, down 2.8 points over two months**  
 ~ Rising procurement costs driven by higher crude oil prices squeezed profits ~

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(Companies researched: 23,083; Valid responses: 10,538; Response rate: 45.7%; Survey start date: May 2002)

**< Trend in April 2026: Sharp Decline >**

The Economic Diffusion Index (DI) for April 2026 declined by 1.4 points from the previous month to 41.5, worsening for the second consecutive month and marking a sharp downturn.

The domestic economy retreated significantly for the second straight month, weighed down by rising crude oil prices, increased procurement cost burdens, delays in passing on higher costs through prices, and a downturn in consumer spending.

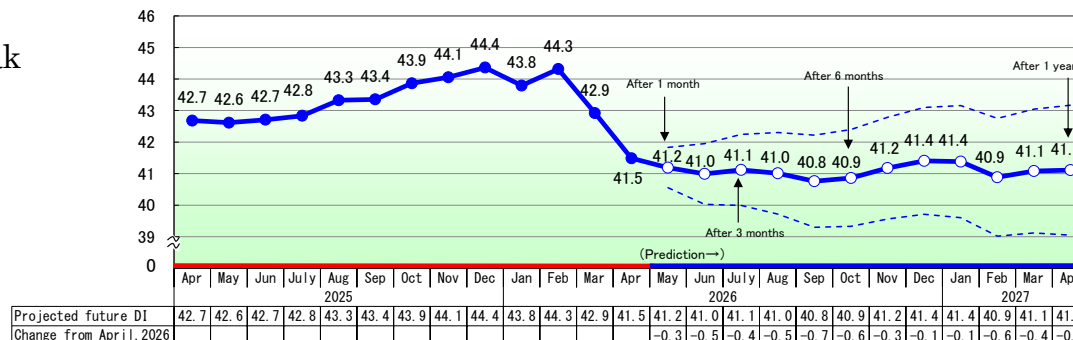
**< Future outlook: Weakening >**

Looking ahead, the domestic economy is expected to remain weak while carrying downside risks.

**By industry:** 9 of 10 industries deteriorated, with the burden of rising input costs emerging as a key negative factor.

**By scale:** All company sizes worsened for the second consecutive month. The DI for “micro firms” fell into the 30-point range for the first time in three years and eight months.

**By region:** All 10 regions deteriorated for the second consecutive month, with five regions slipping into the 30-point range.

Internet-based survey conducted April 16 2026 - April 30 2026

### The explanation of the Economic Diffusion Index

#### Research Purpose/Researched Terms

TDB Economic Trend Research (started from May 2002) is a monthly statistical survey conducted for over 24,000 nationwide corporations on their general business activities including the current condition and future outlook of the industry business performance and operating climate. The primary purpose of such a survey is to assess the current state of Japan's economy.

#### Selection of the Subject Corporations

Companies of all sizes in all domestic industries are eligible to participate in the survey.

#### DI Calculation

The DI (Diffusion Index) is calculated by multiplying the number of responses for each assessment category by the number given in parentheses in the table below, to a seven-level assessment rated by companies.

An economic DI of 50 is **the point separating good and bad**, so a DI over 50 means “good,” and below 50 means “bad.” (The numbers are rounded off to one decimal place.) No weight is given according to a company's size, and calculations are made on the basis of “one company, one vote.”
